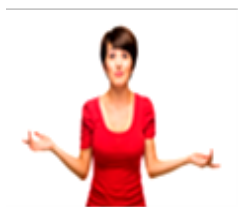


Delirium

(Easy Read Leaflet)

What is delirium?



A feeling of being very confused. It starts suddenly and lasts between one week and three weeks.

How common is it?

1 in 10 people in hospital have delirium.

How can it affect me?



You may not know where you are or what you are doing.



You may hear noises or voices.



You may feel anxious.



You may want to sleep during the day.

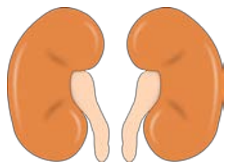


You may find it hard to sleep at night.



You may shout or become angry.

What are the common causes?



A chest or urine infection.



A high body temperature.



Not drinking enough.



Major surgery.



Not going to the toilet.



Pain.

What can I do to help myself?



Have people you know come to visit.



Use your glasses, if you need them.



Use your hearing aids, if you need them.

What can I do to help others?



Remind people where they are.



Tell them what day and time it is.



Get them to drink plenty of fluids.



Offer reassurance.

What will the hospital staff do?



Treat the infection and pain.



Give fluids if required.



Offer reassurance.



Talk to you and your family.




Tell your doctor when you leave the hospital.
